

NEWS BITES

Drug tests, space races and



ports fans in the capital city had another poortunity to show case their national pride after the close of the Paralympics. The first World Mind Sports Games, which include competitions in chess, bridge, checkers, Go and xiangqi (Chinese chess), brought together 3,000 "mind athletes" from more

than 100 countries, all seeking WMS gold. Since doping controls are now de rigueur at any international sporting event, physical or otherwise, competitors underwent the same strict tests as Olympians. It was a formality: No one has yet been caught cheating and, as one

official said, performance-enhancing drugs couldn't conceivably help a mind sports athlete. Still, WMS organizers have bigger aspirations of making it under the IOC umbrella - and if they want to play, they have to comply. There's no word yet on a posthumous test on Bobby Fischer.



Shenzhou VII blasted off last month amid much hoopla, and Chinese around the world eagerly awaited word from the three men aboard. Xinhua jumped the gun in providing the news, printing a statement hom airborne taikonauts before they had lifted-off. The state news agency immediately retracted the statement, chalking it up to technical problems. At least the glitch didn't come at the expense of the actual mission, as was almost the case with China's first man-made earth satellite project in 1970.

Wet nurses are in the money following the milk scandal. Chinese mothers unable to nurse and with money to spare are appealing to agencies for surrogate breasts. Following the revelations, wet nurses

in Guangzhou were commanding RMB 20,000 a month - up from RMB 6,000. Beijing's own household management agencies reported a surge in interest, despite the health risks that abound from the practice. Nutritionists warn that any old breast milk won't do, advising mothers to breast-feed their own babies where possible. Families of many potential wet nurses are also less than thrilled, with some husbands threatening to bar their wives from nursing the infants of others. But if it was good enough for Puyi ... Avant Guard

The humble baoan (security guard) is often seen but 📘 rarely heard from. Usually, he is in his twenties and instantly recognizable from his dark blue uniform and the walkie-talkie strapped to his belt. Ge Wang caught up with one such baoan (who wished to remain anonymous); the chat took place at the CBD's Hou Xiandai Cheng residences, just behind Soho New Town.

Throughout the conversation, the baoan continued about his business: addressing the queries of passing residents and occasionally taking a break to deal with the mumblings on his walkie-talkie.

the Beijinger: Can you estimate how many foreigners are living in this compound?

Wang: I'd say many - probably half of all the residents. Most of them work in Soho.

tbj: How do you communicate with them?

Wang: Well, most of them speak Chinese quite well. I can also say a few words in English. The good thing is they are always as patient as I am, so we communicate well.

tbj: What don't you like about dealing with foreigners?

Wang: The worst is when they ask me for directions. Although I told you a lot of them speak good Mandarin, the problem is, in some cases they don't actually understand the meaning of the words coming out of their mouths. They can say the word fangdong ("landlord") but they don't know what that is. Then I have to try and explain to them that it means the guy who rented their apartment to them, with my broken words and hand gestures.

tbj: And what do you like the most about foreigners?


Wang: They are always polite. Especially when I see them in this residential area. They always nod and say hello to me, with warm smiles on their faces. I actually think sometimes foreigners are more polite than many Chinese.

tbj: Can you remember your first encounter with a foreigner?

Wang: I think it was when I was 12 or 13, and I thought they looked really strange. After a few years, when I was

working in Shandong province, I saw many foreigners living there. Back then I felt kind of intimidated by them, and I thought they wouldn't bother to talk to me if I said something to them. Of course, I've gotten used to them since I came to Beijing, as I see many of them on the streets. Plus, things got better after I became the security guard here as I interact with them all the time. We're all human beings, aren't we? They are not much different than we are.

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
